

When I started going to the Water Ministry in November of 2022, I didn't yet know that I was already almost 3 months pregnant. There, I got to feel safe, clean up, have positive interactions with a lot of people from St. C's and visitors, and got to eat healthy and delicious meals throughout my whole pregnancy. I hadn't been to church in about 13 years, but had been thinking about it for a while, and the sign for Wee Worship caught my eye. When my brand-new baby boy, Rexon, was 1-week old, I brought him to Wee Worship at St. Columba's. I was a bit nervous and awkward feeling, but the atmosphere was so positive and relaxed. After a few weeks, I started attending regular service as well, and started to get to know everyone at church a little better. I had nothing when I came to Water Ministry, except the backpack I was always wearing, and now, with a lot of work, prayer, and tons of help from the other mothers and families at St. C's, I have been blessed with a comfortable home that's well-furnished and close to church, so now it's easy to bring Rexon every week to Wee Worship—a place where it's hard not to see and feel God's presence in all of those sweet, happy children! I'm so grateful every day for the love, support, generosity, kindness, and acceptance that I have received from St. C's more than anywhere else.

Undesign the Redline April 11 - July 11, 2024 Cleveland Park Library

New Exhibit Explores Race-Based Exclusion in Upper Northwest DC



As St. Columba's seeks to address underlying inequities in our society and create the Beloved Community, we are pleased to announce our support for a new educational exhibit: Undesign the Redline. St. Columba's and nearby churches and synagogues have led the process of bringing the exhibit to our area. It is the first time that Undesign the Redline has been initiated by faith communities.

Undesign the Redline is an interactive, traveling exhibit that explores the history of redlining and other race-based exclusion, including the displacement of people and communities of color from their homes and neighborhoods. Beyond learning about this troubling history, the exhibit can help us understand why inequities in housing and wealth persist and encourage us to ask how we can repair the breach.

The format of the exhibit is the same from city to city, but with each new location, local stories are highlighted. This new exhibit will include stories from upper Northwest DC such as St. Columba's complicity in systemic racism, along with that of other nearby institutions.

It's not just the exhibit; there is also a robust slate of programs on topics related to systemic racism and led by local experts from schools, businesses, and history and advocacy organizations. St. Columban, Director of Georgetown University's Center on Faith and Justice, author, and more, Jim Wallis will speak on his newest book The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy. When we see a civic promotion of fear, hate, and violence for the trajectory of our politics, we need a civic faith of love, healing, and hope to defeat it. Learning to practice a politics of neighbor love will be central to the future of democracy in America.
