This liturgy is derived from Year W, for which the lectionary and its translation are the work of Rev. Dr. Wil Gafney. See the liturgical note for more information.



Listen, children, to the instruction of a parent, and be attentive to know understanding. For I give you good instruction; do not forsake my teaching. I was still a child with my father, and my mother's only [child]. And I was taught, and it was said to me, "Let your heart hold fast my words; keep my commandments and you shall live. Acquire wisdom, acquire understanding: Do not forget, nor



The Gospel Mark 2:13-22

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now Jesus went out again beside the sea and the whole crowd gathered around him and he taught them. And as he was walking along he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax booth and he said to him, "Follow me." And he got up and followed him. Then as Jesus reclined to eat in Levi's house, many tax collectors and sinners were also reclining to eat with Jesus and his

disciples, for there were many who followed him. Now when the biblical scholars among the Pharisees saw that Jesus was eating with sinners and tax collectors, they said to his disciples, "Why does he eat with tax collectors and sinners?" And when Jesus heard this, he said to them, "The women and men who are well have no need of a physician, rather those who are sick do; not to call the righteous have I come but rather sinners." Now John's disciples and the Pharisees were fasting and people came and said to Jesus, "Why do John's disciples and the disciples of the Pharisees fast, but your disciples do not fast?" And Jesus said to them, "The attendants of the bridal chamber cannot fast while the bridegroom is with them, can they? As long as they have the bridegroom with them, they cannot fast. Yet the days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them and then they will fast on that day. No one sews a piece of unshrunk cloth on an old garment lest the patch pulls away from it, the new from the old, and a worse tear is formed. And no one puts new wine into old wineskins lest the wine burst the skins and the wine is lost with the wineskins rather, one puts new wine into fresh wineskins."


The Great Thanksgiving

God is here. **Her Spirit is with us.** Lift up your hearts. **We lift them unto God.** Let us give thanks to our Sovereign God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Blessed are you, O God, our light and our salvation; to you be glory and praise for ever. From the beginning you have created all things, and all your works echo the silent music of your praise.

In the fullness of time you made us in your image, the crown of all creation. You give us breath and speech, that with angels and archangels and all the powers of heaven we may find a voice to sing your praise:



How wonderful is the work of your hands, O God. As a mother tenderly gathers her children, you embraced a people as your own. When they turned away and rebelled, your gaze remained steadfast. From them you raised up Jesus to be our Savior, born of Mary, to be the living bread, in whom all our hungers are satisfied. He offered his life for sinners, and with a love stronger than death, he opened wide his arms on the cross.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends, and, taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave thanks, and said: "Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Remembering his life, death, and resurrection, we present to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

Pour out your Holy Spirit upon them that they may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son, holy food and drink of new and unending life. Form us in the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ by whom, with whom, and in whom, with all who stand before you on earth and in heaven, we worship you in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honor and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.


The Lord's Prayer

Invitation to Communion

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Whoever you are, wherever you find yourself on the journey of faith, you are welcome at Christ's table.

Communion

Christ welcomes all to communion. Receive the bread in open and outstretched hands and sip the wine, guiding the chalice to your lips. If you do not want to sip the wine, it is also perfectly appropriate to receive the bread only. We do not allow dipping the bread into the wine. Respond to communion by saying "Amen." If you prefer a blessing, cross your hands over your chest. Gluten-free wafers are available at each communion station. Baptism is offered several times a year; speak to a priest to learn more.

Laying on of Hands and Prayer for Healing

Prayers for Healing (the Healing Rite) are offered in St. Aiden's Chapel during Communion at the 9 and 11:15 am liturgies on the second Sunday of the month. Prayers for yourself or another are welcome. Enter the chapel through the door under the balcony to the right of the altar.

Liturgical Note

During the Season after Epiphany, St. Columba's is using *A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church*, compiled and translated by the Rev. Dr. Wilda C. Gafney. Throughout the season, we will hear feminine characterization of God, and we'll engage the women of the Bible anew. This is an experiment that allows us to notice how stories and names for God impact our connection to God and to one another. Listen for what comforts and challenges you, for what encourages or confuses you. *A Women's Lectionary* gives the opportunity to be curious and to notice. Names of God included in opening prayers and Prayers of the People also come from resources by the Rev. Dr. Wil Gafney.
