Reading *seated* 2 Kings 5:1-4, 9-14

Naaman, commander of the army of the ruler of Aram, was a great man in the sight of his master and highly esteemed, because through him the HOLY ONE had given victory to Aram. The man, a great warrior, was diseased in his skin. Now Aramean troops went out and took captive from the land of Israel a young girl, and she was placed before Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would take his skin disease away." So Naaman went in and told his master the girl from the land of Israel had said this and this.

Then Naaman came with his horses and chariot and stood at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, who said, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be unblemished." But Naaman became angry and left, saying,

“Look here! I thought that for me he would surely come out and stand and call on the name of the MOST HIGH, his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and take away the skin disease! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be restored?” Then he turned and went away in a rage. But his slaves approached and said to him, “My father, were it a great thing the prophet told you to do, would you not have done it? How much more, when what he said to you was, ‘Wash, and be restored?’” So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was renewed like the flesh of a little boy, and he was restored.

The Gospel Mark 3:1-12

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now Jesus returned to the synagogue and a person was there who had a withered hand. And the women and men in the synagogue were watching him carefully to see whether he would cure the person on the sabbath so that they might accuse him. Then Jesus said to the person who had the withered hand, "Come up to the middle." Then Jesus said to the women and men in the synagogue, "Is it permissible to do good or to do evil on the sabbath, to save life or to kill?" But they were silent. And looking around at them with anger Jesus was grieved at their hardness of heart and said to the person, "Stretch out your hand." And the person stretched it out and their hand was restored. Then the Pharisees went out with the Herodians and immediately began to conspire against Jesus, how they might destroy him.

Then Jesus with his disciples departed to the sea and a great multitude from Galilee followed, and from Judaea, Jerusalem, Idumea, beyond the Jordan, and the region around Tyre and Sidon, hearing all that he was doing, they came to him. And he told his disciples to have a boat at hand for him because of the crowd of women, children, and men lest they crush him. For he had cured many, so that as many as had diseases pressed upon him to touch him. And the unclean spirits, when they saw him, they fell down before him and shrieked, "You are the Son of God!" But Jesus rebuked them strongly not to make him known.

Liturgical Note

During the Season after Epiphany, St. Columba's is engaging *The Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church*, compiled and translated by the Rev. Dr. Wilda C. Gafney. This series is often short-handed as "Year W" for woman and womanist. Womanism is a movement of Black Women that recognizes the intersections of gender, race, and class.

Throughout the season, we will hear feminine characterization of God, and we'll engage the women of the Bible anew. This is an experiment that allows us to notice how stories and names for God impact our connection to God and to one another. Listen for what comforts and challenges you, for what encourages or confuses you. *The Women's Lectionary* gives the opportunity to be curious and to notice.

Names of God included in Opening Prayers and Prayers of the People also come from resources by the Rev. Dr. Wil Gafney.
