

The Gospel Mark 9:30-37

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

The Great Thanksgiving

God be with you.



Invitation to Communion

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Whoever you are, wherever you find yourself on the journey of faith, you are welcome at Christ's table.

Communion

Christ welcomes all to communion. ■ Receive the bread in open and outstretched hands and sip the wine, guiding the chalice to your lips. ■ If you do not want to sip the wine, it is also perfectly appropriate to receive the bread only. We do not allow dipping the bread into the wine. ■ Respond to communion by saying "Amen." ■ If you prefer a blessing, cross your hands over your chest. ■ Gluten-free wafers are available at each communion station. ■ Baptism is offered several times a year; speak to a priest to learn more.

Laying on of Hands and Prayer for Healing

The Healing Rite is offered in St. Aiden's Chapel during Communion at the 9 and 11:15 am liturgies on the second and fourth Sundays of the month. Prayers for yourself or another are welcome. Enter the chapel through the door under the balcony to the right of the altar, or visit the station at the back of the nave.

Liturgical Note—The Season of Creation (seasonofcreation.org) is an ecumenical celebration that invites us to listen to and care for “this fragile earth, our island home,” as we hear in Eucharistic Prayer C. In this season, stretching from the Feast of Creation on September 1 through the Feast of St. Francis on October 4, Christians around the world join in prayer and action, renewing a commitment to care for the gift of God’s creation. Our creed is from Tírechán, a 7th-century Irish bishop best known for his biography of St. Patrick. The Prayers of the People are inspired by the language St. Francis often used in describing creation.

Land Acknowledgement—We meet today on the traditional land of the first people of Nacotchtank, who were custodians of the land for thousands of years, caring for and nurturing it. We give thanks for their stewardship and lament the ways the Nacotchtank were removed from their ancestral home. We pray for all who live on this land and pay our respects to the native leaders past, present, and emerging.

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St. Columba's Episcopal Church is an inclusive Christian community of all ages that welcomes one and all, encourages spiritual curiosity, celebrates children and youth, and embraces the world in the spirit of God's justice and love.

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
